





The critically acclaimed stage adaptation of *Life of Pi* by **Yann Martel**, which opened in London's West End last November, is shortlisted in every single <u>Olivier Awards</u> category for which it is eligible! Winners will be announced April 10th. The fact that *Life of Pi* started as a novel, became a Hollywood movie, and now a play in the West End truly testifies to the power of words to travel across formats.




Kim Fu's collection of stories *Lesser Known Monsters of the 21*st *Century* (p.16) published in February and earned six starred pre-publication reviews. Published in Canada by Coach House Books and in the U.S. by Tin House Books, and forthcoming in Australia and New Zealand with Brio Books, it was called "powerful" (*Kirkus*), "breathtaking" (*Foreword*), "fabulous" (*Booklist*), "fantastic" (*Shelf Awareness*), "incisive" (*Quill & Quire*), and "a winner" (*Publishers Weekly*). *The New York Times Book Review* also called it "elusive and beckoning," and popular outlets like *The Hollywood Reporter*, NPR, and *Buzzfeed* have featured the collection in their list of hot new books. Racconti bought Italian rights, and Host bought Czech rights. Stay tuned for film/T.V. news for Fu!

With the release of *Tripping Arcadia* (p. 25) in February, **Kit Mayquist** and his debut novel have been featured by <u>Debutiful</u>, <u>Writer's Digest</u>, <u>BookPage</u>, and over two dozen most anticipated and best-of roundups, including <u>Ms. Magazine</u>, <u>Book Riot</u>, <u>Gayming</u>, and <u>Red Carpet Crash</u>. Additionally, *Tripping Arcadia* has been selected by Shelves Bookstore in Charlotte, N.C. as their book subscription box title. Forthcoming appearances and features include an interview with *How Do You Write* and *The Bookstagays*, an essay with CrimeReads, a reading list compiled for Electric Lit, and a feature with Belletrist in April!



Mindful of Murder - **Susan Juby**'s newest novel - published in March and landed immediately at #1 on the national independent bookstores' bestsellers list! Canadian Living magazine said:



"Take one newly graduated domestic professional, a holistic retreat on an isolated island, a murdered mentor and a group of fractious suspects and you have the makings of this comedic mystery from the lauded author of the hilarious *Republic of Dirt.*" 'Knives Out' meets P.G. Wodehouse in this compelling, cozy mystery.

Frances Itani, author of numerous novels including *The Company We Keep, Requiem*, and *Deafening*, was honored with the <u>Matt Cohen Award</u>, which recognizes a lifetime of distinguished work by a Canadian writer. The jury wrote: "Time after time, Itani tells an intimate, universal,

and poignant story. Her sculpted prose, quietly breathtaking, leaves us haunted and yearning for more."

In December, Indigenous author **Tomson Highway** was named an Officer of the Order of Canada in honor of his contributions to theater and Canadian culture. Highway's <u>award-winning</u> 2021 memoir, *Permanent Astonishment*, offers hilarious and profound insights into the Cree experience of culture, conquest, and survival; it's a 2022 nominee for the <u>Evergreen Award</u>, and the Emmywinning production company White Pine Pictures is scheduled to begin filming a documentary adaptation this spring. Also last December, WCA client **Yann Martel** was named a Companion to the Order of Canada for his literary contributions and philanthropic commitment.




And in further non-fiction news, **Rahaf Mohammed**'s gripping memoir *Rebel* (p. 43) published on March 8th, and has caused considerable stir internationally. Publishing in nineteen territories, this young Saudi woman's brave story of survival and empowerment has spoken to readers around the world. Rahaf made the cover of *The Times Magazine*, which ran an excerpt of her book. *Kirkus* gave the book a glowing review, writing: "Mohammed creates a tense narrative of her desperate flight, the efforts of her powerful father to stop her, and the determined journalist who came to her aid. An absorbing chronicle of courage." *Publishers Weekly* wrote that the book leaves "an indelible mark. Her scorching indictment serves as a beacon for women worldwide yearning for freedom," while *The Daily Mail* gave it four stars. *The Guardian* named it the Book of

the Day in their Sunday edition, saying, "In nearly 300 pages of simple but effective prose, Rahaf Mohammed turns her journey into one that vast numbers of women in Saudi Arabia will relate to."

Michael Ignatieff was named chair of the jury for the Cundhill History Prize, which was awarded during the 2021 Frankfurt Book Fair. His latest book, *On Consolation* (p. 37), published in Canada with Random House and in the U.S. with Metropolitan/Henry Holt in November of last year, and has been sold in eleven other territories. The book was reviewed in <u>Shelf Awareness</u>, <u>The New York Times</u>, and listed in *Lit Hub*.

Bitcoin Widow: Love, Betrayal, and the Missing Millions, a memoir by **Jennifer Robertson**, attracted significant television, radio, and print attention immediately upon publication in January. It was front page news in The Globe & Mail, featured in the Globe's podcast The Decibel and in The Walrus' podcast The Deep Dive, and covered in The Daily Mail, The Independent, and The Sunday Times, leading to a flurry of film interest and a swift pre-empt to lock up those rights by Nikki Ray Media. It immediately landed on the non-fiction bestseller lists in The Globe & Mail and Toronto Star and continues to be a consistent feature there.



John Bemrose THE RIVER TWICE

A Novel

Wounded in body and spirit, Ted Whitfield returns home from the trenches to his wife, Miriam, who finds him deeply altered and virtually unreachable. Her sister, Grace, afflicted by her own secret trauma, falls into an immediate and electric affinity with Ted, and soon he is telling her – and only her – a story from the front lines that's as shocking as it is extraordinary. As the novel moves back and forth between the lush, rolling landscape of southern Ontario and the devastated French countryside where exhausted Canadian troops are entrenched, the three characters at the center of the narrative become entwined in almost unbearable tension.


Miriam and Grace's nine-year-old brother, Will, a thoughtful, quiet boy who often sees the adults more clearly than they see themselves, is at the moral center of the story. Each of Bemrose's finely constructed characters strives to be as true and as honest as they can with one another, and yet are caught up in the evasions and deceptions that so complicate human life, especially during a war and its aftermath.

The River Twice does for Canada what Pat Barker's The Regeneration Trilogy did for England – focuses our collective memory on the moral injustices that attend any war, contemporary or historic. John Bemrose draws readers in and won't let them go until the last page of this astonishingly lyrical and deeply humane novel.



JOHN BEMROSE's first novel, *The Island Walkers*, was a national bestseller, a finalist for the Giller Prize, and longlisted for the Man Booker Prize. He is also a well-known arts journalist with published reviews and articles in *The Globe & Mail*, *The National Post*, and *Maclean's*. His second novel, *The Last Woman*, was published in 2009. He

has also published poetry and written a play, *Mother Moon*. Bemrose was born and raised in Paris, Ontario, a place that has inspired the settings for his fiction, including his latest novel, *The River Twice*. He lives in Toronto.

Gina Buonaguro THE VIRGINS OF VENICE



Amid this political turmoil, noblewoman Justina Soranzo, just sixteen, hopes to make a rare love marriage with her sweetheart, Luca Cicogna. Her hopes are dashed when her father decides her younger sister Rosa will marry for a strategic alliance while Justina will be sent to San Zaccaria convent. But Lord Soranzo is not acting only to protect his family. It's well known that he is in debt to both his trading partners and the most infamous courtesan in the city, La Diamante, and the pressure is closing in.

Arriving at the convent, Justina takes solace in her Aunt Livia, a nun there, and the growing knowledge that all is not strictly devout at San Zaccaria. Justina is shocked to discover how the women of the convent find their own freedom in what seems to her like a prison. Soon, secrets, family scandals, and a threat from La Diamante erupt and Justina turns to Luca in ways she never expected, to protect the ones she loves. Will Justina risk her noble status, her family's good name, and the purity of her soul to follow her heart?



GINA BUONAGURO is the co-author of *The Wolves of St. Peter's, Ciao Bella, The Sidewalk Artist* and a number of romance titles under the name Meadow Taylor. This is her first solo novel. She has a BA in English from Villanova University (Pennsylvania) and attained an MA in English from the University of British Columbia while on a Fulbright Scholarship. Born in New Jersey, Buonaguro lives in Toronto.



Charles Demers NOONDAY DARK

Dr. Annick Boudreau Mystery #2

The endearing and unflappable Dr. Boudreau returns in this complex and nuanced portrait of psychology and a city. When Dr. Boudreau is contacted by the Vancouver Police and informed that her patient Danielle has been reported missing and there's a suicide note, she is shaken. 
Bruce Geddes CHASING THE BLACK EAGLE


Don Gillmor BREAKING AND ENTERING

Haunted by the ominous shadows of a family history she does not know, Anja must follow a perilous path into unfamiliar, wilderness terrain that will ultimately allow her to find her future – and herself.

Wayne Johnston JENNIE'S BOY

A Newfoundland Childhood


Sad, tender, and at times extremely funny, this is the story of a Newfoundland boyhood few thought the author would survive, himself included. For six months between 1966 and 1967, Wayne Johnston and his family lived in a wreck of a house across from his grandparents in Goulds, Newfoundland, among a scattering of houses on an unpaved road. At seven, Johnston was sickly, skinny, unable to keep food down or sleep, plagued with a relentless and undiagnosable cough, though doctors had already removed his tonsils, adenoids, and appendix. Heart murmur, pleurisy, a tapeworm? All were suspected; none confirmed. To the community he was known as "Jennie's boy," and his tiny, ferocious mother felt judged for his condition and worried he might not grow up to be his own man.

While his brothers went to school, and his parents to work, trying to stave off the next eviction, Johnston spent his days with his witty, religious, deeply eccentric maternal grandmother, Lucy, who kept a statue of the Blessed Virgin in her bedroom along with a photo of her son Leonard, who had died at seven. During these six months of Johnston's childhood, he and Lucy faced two life-or-death crises, and only one of them lived to tell the tale.

Jennie's Boy is Johnston's tribute to a family and community that were fiercely protective of him and fed up with making allowances for him: grandparents, parents and siblings, aunts and uncles, and the people of Goulds, whose pet and nuisance he was. He recalls a boyhood full of pain but also laughter, tenderness, and the kind of wit that is peculiar to Newfoundlanders. By that wit, and by their love for each other so often expressed in the most unloving ways, he, and they, survived.







Jamal Saeed MY ROAD FROM DAMASCUS

A Memoir

Jamal Saeed arrived as a refugee in Canada in 2016. In his native Syria, as a young man, his writing pushed both social and political norms. For this reason, as well as his opposition to the regimes of the al-Assads, he was imprisoned on three occasions for a total of twelve years. In each instance, held without formal charge and without benefit of judicial process.

My Road from Damascus not only tells the story of his twelve years in Syria's most notorious military prisons, but also his life during the country's dramatic changes. From the 1950s right up to his escape to Canada in 2016, Saeed chronicles the life of modern Syria and its descent from a country of potential to the pawn of cynical and corrupt powers. It paints a picture of village life, how he first rebelled as a young Marxist and then evolved into a free thinker; it explores how he lived in hiding as a teenager for thirty months while being hunted by the secret police, his youthful love affairs, how he survived twelve brutal years in various prisons, his final release and his family's harrowing escape to Canada.

While many prison memoirs focus on the cruelty of incarceration, *My Road from Damascus* offers a tapestry of Saeed's whole life. It looks squarely at brutality, but also at beauty and poetry, hope and love.


