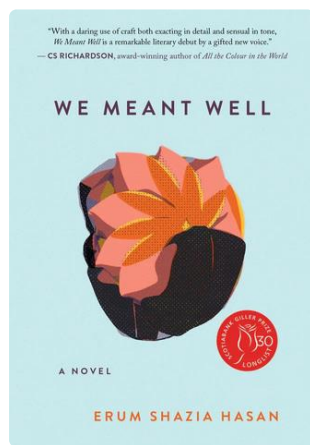

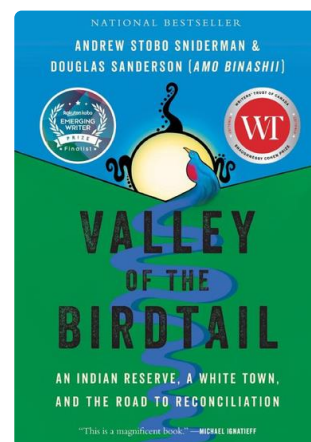
We are proud to present the Fall 2023 edition of Westwood Creative Artists' rights catalogue. Please allow us to highlight some of our clients' recent accomplishments.



Starting off with awards nominations, we are thrilled that **Erum Shazia Hasan**'s debut novel, *We Meant Well* ([p. 21](#)) – a provocative and propulsive story about a well intentioned international aid worker who faces professional and personal crises when a colleague is accused of sexual assault – has been longlisted for the [Scotiabank Giller Prize](#)! Praised for its daring use of craft and its uncomfortable, nuanced insights into the legacy of colonialism, it was named a [Most Anticipated Feminist Book of 2023 by Ms Magazine](#) and has been selected for the [Great Group Reads program of the Women's National Book Association](#). This is an emotionally complex novel that is equal parts unsparing and compassionate. ECW Press holds North American English rights to *We Meant Well*; all other rights, including film/TV, are available.

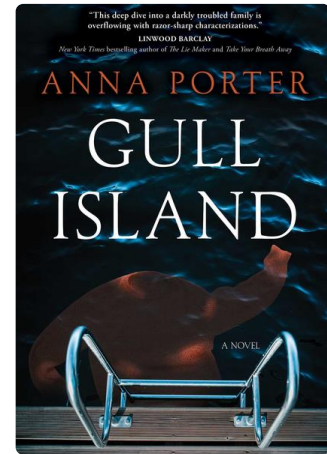
We have quite the roster of comedians amongst our clients: **Wayne Johnston**'s *Jennie's Boy* – a heartfelt, funny memoir about his Newfoundland childhood – has won the \$25,000 [Leacock Medal for Humour](#). **Susan Juby**'s *Mindful of Murder* was shortlisted for the award while **Thomas King**'s *Deep House* (Book 6 in the DreadfulWater mystery series) and **Bobbi French**'s multi-award-nominated debut novel *The Good Women of Safe Harbour* both made the longlist. We are grateful to all of these writers for the much appreciated levity they bring to their work!

Valley of the Birdtail by **Andrew Stobo Sniderman** and **Douglas Sanderson** took the 2022/2023 literary award scene by storm, building up quite the list of nominations and wins. The nominations include the shortlist for the Kobo Emerging Writer Prize, the longlist for the First Nations Communities Read Award, and the shortlist for the [Shaughnessy Cohen Prize](#), an award that celebrates the best in Canadian political writing. The jury for the Shaughnessy Cohen Prize described the book as a “masterfully written and accessible book which will resonate well beyond Canada.” Its many wins include the Stubbendieck Great Plains Distinguished Book Prize, the Manitoba Historical Society [Margaret McWilliams Award](#), and the [J.W. Dafoe Book Prize](#), the jury of which said that “*Valley of the Birdtail* is the most clear-eyed and compassionate book on the legacy of Indigenous inequality... It's maddening in parts, wryly funny in other parts.”



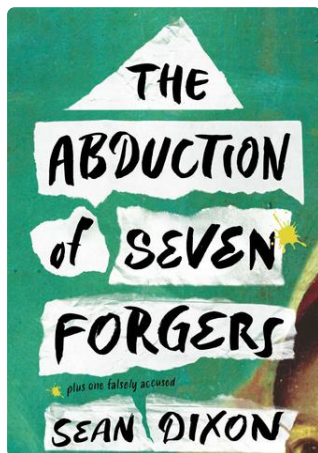
Kim Fu, who was shortlisted for last year's Scotiabank Giller Prize for her fabulist story collection *Lesser Known Monsters of the 21st Century*, has won the 2023 [Washington State Book Award](#), the 2023 [Pacific Northwest Book Prize](#), the [2022 Danuta Gleed Literary Award](#), and the [2022 Shirley Jackson Award](#). Her story “Pre-Simulation Consultation XF007867” will be featured in [The Best American Science Fiction and Fantasy 2023](#) anthology, selected by R.F. Kuang. Meanwhile, two of the stories in this much lauded collection have been optioned for film adaptation (details are under wraps for now). Rights have sold in the US, Australia, Turkey, Italy, France, and the Czech Republic.

And in other honors, we're delighted to see that **Anna Porter's** *Gull Island* has been selected as Barnes & Noble's [October 2023 Mystery/Thriller Monthly Pick](#), bringing with it a first print run of 45,000 copies! Published by Simon & Schuster Canada, it arrives with accolades from best-selling authors Catherine McKenzie, who said it "will leave you guessing about what is real and what is imagined until the very last page," and Anne Giardini, who called it "a real tour de force, with a strong sense of place, memorable characters, and a tightly wound plot." All rights outside of Canada and the US are available.



[The New York Times](#) gave **Don Gillmor's** *Breaking and Entering* ([p. 18](#)) a rave review in August, with Wadzanai Mhute praising it for "deftly converg[ing] doubt, infidelity and the fragility of family in a narrative that is both thrilling and relatable." Set during the hottest summer on record, the novel is about a bored and lonely 49-year-old woman who Googles "escape," joins a lock picking club, and then puts her new skills to use breaking into her neighbors' houses in an attempt to unearth their secrets, only to discover one closer to home. In its starred review, [Kirkus](#) called it "a smart, funny, and sneakily terrifying version of the way we live now," while [The Globe & Mail](#) deemed it "a fitting book for the moment in which we are living, staring down a housing crisis, a health-care crisis, a climate crisis, an affordability crisis, and, no doubt, a crisis or two of our own personal variety." North American rights are held by Biblioasis; all other rights, including film/TV, are available.

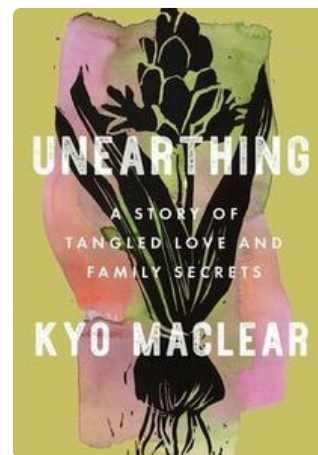
The Girls from Hush Cabin ([p. 23](#)), the debut novel by **Marie Hoy-Kenny** which published on August 15th with Blackstone, was named a Barnes & Noble [Top Indie Favorite](#) for August/September 2023. The *Lambda Literary Review* included the book in [their list](#) of August's Most Anticipated LGBTQIA+ Literature, and Hoy-Kenny was featured on *CBC Radio's* morning program in a segment about how her grade nine teacher predicted she'd become a published author. Governor General's award-nominated playwright and author **Sean Dixon's** *The Abduction of Seven Forgers* has received a starred review from [Quill & Quire](#): "A novel as sheerly entertaining as it is profound is a rare treat, and Sean Dixon's newest work is exactly that... Surprising, fun, and unexpectedly serious... A genuinely excellent read." Freehand Books holds Canadian English rights; all other rights are available.

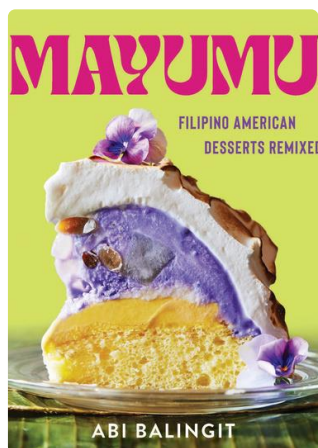
Giller Prize-winning author **Elizabeth Hay's** latest novel, the coming-of-middle-age story *Snow Road Station*, received a coveted review in [The New Yorker](#), which praised the novel as "sensitive" and noted that "Hay makes a case for the simplicity of pleasure." UK and Commonwealth rights to *Snow Road Station* – acclaimed by Mary Lawson as "joyous and lyrical," and by Ann-Marie MacDonald as "exquisitely etched" – have been picked up by the Mountain Leopard Press imprint of Headline at Hachette.

Our authors' non-fiction offerings have been earning rave reviews and widespread publicity as well. Since its US publication by Scribner in August, **Kyo Maclear's** remarkable work of literary memoir *Unearthing: A Story of Tangled Love and Family Secrets* ([p. 43](#)) has been hailed as "unforgettable" by *People Magazine*, "masterful, original... truly a wow" by [Good Morning America](#) columnist Zibby Owens, "generous, open-handed" by [NPR](#), and "poetic in the best sense" by [BookPage](#), while the [Washington Post](#) review praised it as "a moving account of a daughter's struggle to know her mother before she loses her... A reminder of the abundance of experience present in all families, and the power and healing that can come from honoring those many truths." *Unearthing* was selected for [Literary Hub's](#) list of best new releases, [AudioFile's](#) best audiobooks of August, and [CBC Books' Spring 2023](#) list. Knopf Canada



published the memoir in April and Pushkin Press in the UK will publish in March 2024. Korean rights were sold to Barambooks and Russian rights to AdMarginem; all other rights, including film/TV, are available.

Matthew R. Morris' debut essay collection, *Black Boys Like Me: Confrontations with Race, Identity, and Belonging* ([p. 44](#)), which brings readers into the world of Black masculinity, hip-hop culture, and education, has received some fantastic pre-publication blurbs in advance of its January 2024 publication with Viking Canada. Kiese Laymon, author of *Heavy*, praised the book, stating: "*Black Boys Like Me* ignited parts of me I honestly didn't believe any book could ever know. The language, and all its frequencies, pulses and settles in ways reminiscent of the first time I read bell hooks." Dr. Robin DiAngelo, *New York Times* bestselling author of *White Fragility* and *Nice Racism*, shared similar praise, calling it: "Gorgeously written... A must-read for understanding both the big and little Rs of racism and how it implicates all of us in different ways, relative to our positions within it." Curtis Carmichael, author of *Butterflies in the Trenches*, deemed it "a certified classic," while Saga Boy author Antonio Michael Downing called it "always real – authentic, brave, and vulnerable."



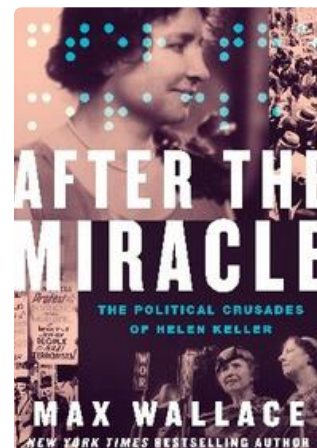
Mayumu: Filipino American Desserts Remixed ([p. 35](#)) by **Abi Balingit** has continued to receive a mountain of media attention since its publication in the spring. The accomplishments are too many to list in full, but here is a short collection of highlights: Balingit was named one of [Brooklyn's 50 Most Fascinating People](#); *Mayumu* made the *Tasting Table's* list of the [Best Cookbooks of 2023 So Far](#); Balingit was [invited to the Philippine Embassy in Washington, DC](#) to talk about her book as part of the Embassy's celebration of National Filipino Food Month; [the recipe](#) for Pastillas de Leche was featured in *The New York Times* alongside [an interview](#) Balingit gave for *The New York Times Magazine*; *Mayumu* was selected for *Forbes'* [20 Must-Read Asian American Authored Books list](#) and Balingit was [interviewed](#) by *Forbes*; *Vogue Philippines* [interviewed](#) the author; *Mayumu* made [Amazon's Best Books of 2023 So Far list](#); it was recommended by Nigella Lawson in her [Cookbook Corner newsletter](#); *New York Magazine* listed *Mayumu* as one of the [48 Most Giftable Coffee-Table Books](#); and more.

Shohini Ghose, TED senior fellow and author of *Her Space, Her Time* ([p. 37](#)) (due out this month from MIT Press and Random House Canada) has just been appointed [Chief Technology Officer of the Quantum Algorithms Institute in Vancouver](#). Her work there will include developing real-world applications of quantum computing, and building the future quantum workforce. Meanwhile *Her Space, Her Time* has been attracting enthusiastic advance notices. Donna Strickland, co-recipient of the 2018 Nobel Prize in Physics, praised it as “a captivating book that honors and highlights a wonderful selection of women who broke boundaries and challenged conventions in science and society.” And world-renowned astronaut Chris Hadfield called it “a vital, intimate chronicle of the indomitable women science pioneers who fought to better understand the universe.” All translation rights except Spanish and Korean are available.

Review coverage of *After the Miracle: The Political Crusades of Helen Keller* by **Max Wallace** has been fulsome. Haben Girma, celebrated disability justice activist, hailed it as a “riveting series of adventures with Helen Keller, from befriending Charlie Chaplin in Hollywood to calling out apartheid in South Africa. Helen’s delightful wit and fierce dedication to advocating for underrepresented people makes her a timeless role model.” And [USA Today](#) called it “a major biography of the blind and deaf disability rights icon, shining a spotlight on her lifelong fight for social justice and the work she did with her voice once she found it.”

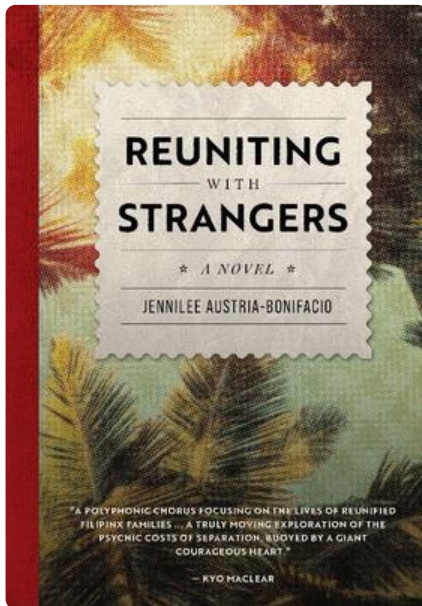

When five-year-old Monolith is taken from the Philippines to live with his mother in Canada, he immediately lashes out. Unable or unwilling to speak, he attacks her and destroys his new home. Everyone wants to know why and has a theory. But unlike the solid certainty his name suggests, the answer isn't so simple.

From the Tagaytay highlands of the Philippines, to the Filipino communities in the desert of Osoyoos, the Arctic world of Iqaluit, the suburbs of southern Ontario, Montreal's Côte-des-Neiges, and Toronto's Little Manila, Austria-Bonifacio takes readers into the kaleidoscope of the Filipino diaspora, uncovering the displacement, estrangement, resilience, and healing that happen behind closed doors.

As each chapter unfolds, truths are revealed in humorous, joyful, devastating, and surprising ways: through a caregiver's instruction manual, a custody battle over texts and e-mails, a self-help guide, a series of desperate résumés, a kundiman songbook, and more. Monolith appears again and again, as a misbehaving boy in a store, the subject of town gossip, a face in a fundraising campaign, a client in questionable care, a dying man's beacon of hope – and an unlikely new friend.

Compellingly readable, incisive and resonant, Austria-Bonifacio's stunning debut opens a window into the homes and hearts of the Filipino-Canadian community.

In exchange for permission to build a church, Valignano “gifts” his protector to Nobunaga, and the young East African man is reminded once again that he is less of a human and more of a thing to be traded and sold.

After pledging his allegiance to the Japanese warlord, the two men from vastly different worlds develop a trust and respect for one another. The young soldier is granted the role of samurai, a title that has never been given to a foreigner; he is also given a new name: Yasuke. Not all are happy with Yasuke's ascension. There are whispers that he may soon be given his own fief, his own servants, his own samurai to command. But all of his dreams hinge on his ability to protect his new lord from threats both military and political, and from enemies both without and within.

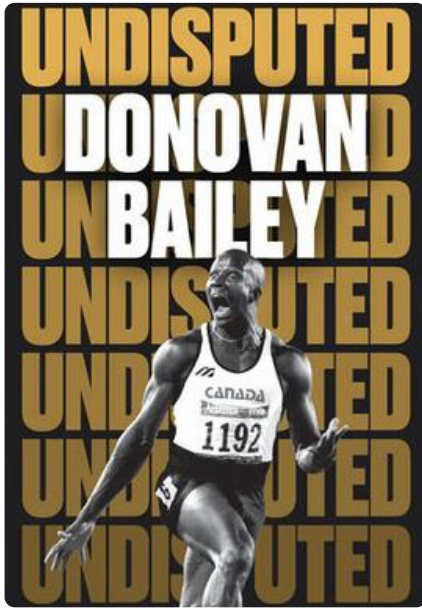

Donovan Bailey UNDISPUTED

From the lush fields of his boyhood in Jamaica, to the basketball courts of Oakville, where he came of age in one of Canada's most thriving cultural mosaics, to his sprint toward double Olympic gold for Canada in Atlanta in 1996, Donovan Bailey got a long way on natural talent. But he also learned that in the bureaucratic world of Canadian sports, an athlete who didn't come up in the system needed to take charge of his fate if he was going to become the world's best. As he ascended from outsider to dominant athlete, others didn't always understand the rigor at work behind Bailey's confident demeanor. He'd learned from watching Muhammad Ali that a champion needed to act like a champion. But media grew fixated on the sprinter's immodesty, the likes of which they never saw from Canadian athletes, especially track athletes in the wake of the Ben Johnson doping scandal at Seoul in 1988. Bailey was having none of it, and when he called out Canada's subtle racism and contradicted the prevailing idea most Canadians had of their country, he left in his wake a media uproar and cracked wide open the nation's moral complacency.

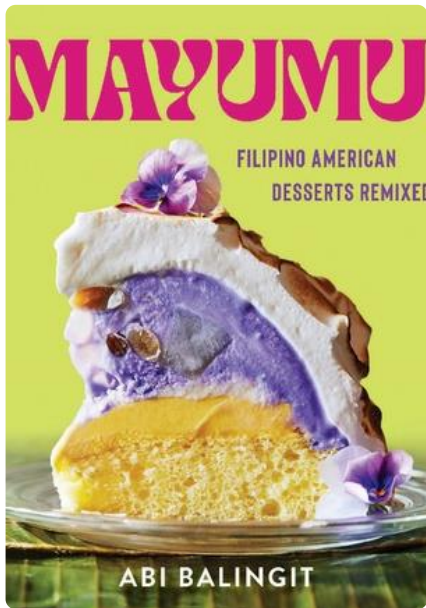
In addition to his unforgettable 100-metre and 4×100 relay gold-medal sprints in Atlanta, Bailey's track career was a litany of records and rare accomplishments, including his audacious 1997 race in Toronto's SkyDome against American 200-metre Olympic champion Michael Johnson to determine who was really the world's fastest man. There was no disputing the result.

Bailey had been coached in success before he was seriously coached in athletics. Following the lead of his father, a machinist-turned-real estate investor, Bailey became a millionaire by the age of 21, an experience he continues to draw on as an entrepreneur and philanthropist. Frank about his dominance on the track and unapologetic for expecting as much of those around him as he expects of himself, *Undisputed* is an athlete's story that refuses to settle for second best.



DONOVAN BAILEY is one of the world's most dominant sprinting legends. He is the first man in history to be world champion, Olympic champion and world record holder at the same time. He's also the only person to be inducted into Canada's Sports Hall of Fame twice. Since retirement in 2001, he has worked as a commentator for CBC, CTV and Eurosport. Kate Gies IT MUST BE BEAUTIFUL TO BE FINISHED

Sometimes fixing the problem is the problem.

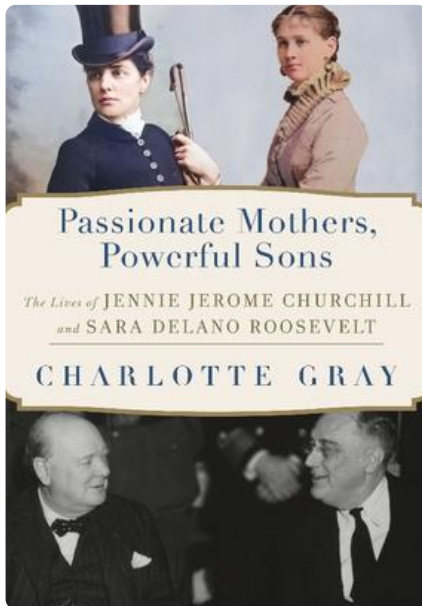
When Kate Gies was four years old, a plastic surgeon pressed a synthetic ear to the right side of her head and pulled out a mirror. He told her he could make her “whole” – could make her “right” – and she believed him. From the age of four to thirteen, she underwent fifteen surgeries, including skin and bone grafts, to craft the appearance of an outer ear. Many of the surgeries failed, leaving permanent damage to her body.

Written in short, lyrical vignettes, *It Must Be Beautiful to Be Finished* is the story of a “disfigured” body scrutinized, pathologized, and even weaponized. It details the physical and psychic trauma of medical intervention, and its effects on Gies’ burgeoning sense of self as a child needing to be fixed – and later, as a teenaged girl and adult navigating the complex expectations and dangers of being a woman. Put simply, this book will punch readers in the gut. Gies does not hold back; she is unflinching in her telling, and the result is a memoir that is beautiful, sad, shocking, and at times truly horrifying.

The book questions our culture’s desire to define a person’s appearance as a medical necessity and highlights the lengths our society will go to discipline and “normalize” a body. It is the story of a girl desperately trying to have a body that makes her acceptable, and of a woman learning to own a body she never felt was hers to define. In an age of speaking out about the abuse of marginalized bodies, this memoir takes a hard look at the medical system’s role in body oppression and trauma.

KATE GIES is a writing professor at George Brown College in Toronto. She was a participant in the Iowa Writers’ Summer Workshop and was a finalist for the CBC Non-fiction Prize. Her essay “Foreign Bodies” (excerpted from *It Must Be Beautiful to Be Finished*) is being included in the forthcoming *Best Canadian Essays* anthology by Biblioasis.

Emelia Symington-Fedy SKID DOGS

Emelia Symington-Fedy grew up with her girl gang on the railroad tracks of a small town in British Columbia. Unsupervised and wild, the girls explored the power and shortcomings of "best" friendships and their growing sexuality.

Jenny Heijun Wills ASIAN, ADOPTED, QUEER, HUNGRY

Essays on Being Everything and Nothing at All

From Hilary Weston Prize-winning author Jenny Heijun Wills, reflections on ambiguity, stereotypes about queer Asian diasporic women, and how she might exist in the in-between when the world so desperately wants her to fit its image of what she should be.

As an adoptee, Wills navigates the in-betweenness of race and ethnicity. As an Asian pan-polyam femme, she occupies a liminal space between family and “freedom,” queerness and heteronormativity, monogamy and a constellation of love. As a person who self-harms to cope with mental illness, she balances wanting to be beautiful and making herself ugly, preening in the limelight while daily wishing her body would disappear. As a parent with a lifelong eating disorder, her love language is to feed, but she herself refuses to consume love; she is both culturally consumed and consumes culture to learn how to be what society expects of her. In these devastating, illuminating, and beautifully crafted essays, Wills draws together the aesthetics of lyrical life writing and the intellectual rigor of her decades-long academic practice, experimenting and innovating along the way both with the notion of identity and the literary forms typically deployed to express it. The outcome is a collection of linked essays, each one building upon the last, that demonstrates meditation, curiosity, social awareness, but also irony and play.

JENNY HEIJUN WILLS is a creative writer and scholar (critical race and American studies) who was born in Seoul, South Korea and was adopted and raised in a white family in Canada. She’s lived, studied, and worked in Toronto, Montreal, Boston, and Seoul, and holds a PhD in English Literary Studies. She currently teaches at the University of Winnipeg in Manitoba where she is the first creative writer serving as Chancellor’s Research Chair. The author of over 50 essays and co-editor of two essay collections, she won the 2019 Hilary Weston Writers’ Trust Prize for Non-fiction for her debut book *Older Sister. Not Necessarily Related.*, a heartbreaking memoir about kinship and culture rediscovered. Wills is a Fulbright Alum (Harvard) and a graduate of the School of Criticism and Theory (Cornell), and in 2016 was Visiting Scholar at the Center for the Comparative Study of Race and Ethnicity (Stanford).

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
