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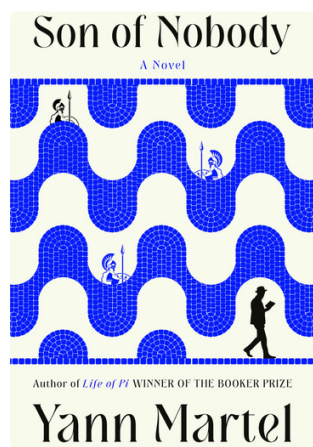
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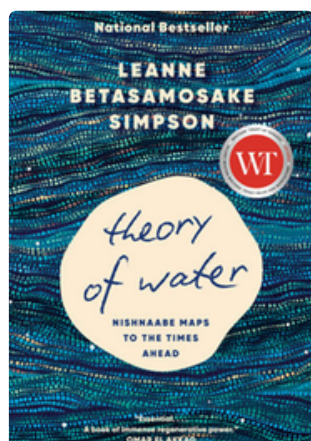

We are honored to present our 2026 London Book Fair catalogue. Please allow us a few paragraphs to extol and highlight some of our authors' impressive recent accomplishments.



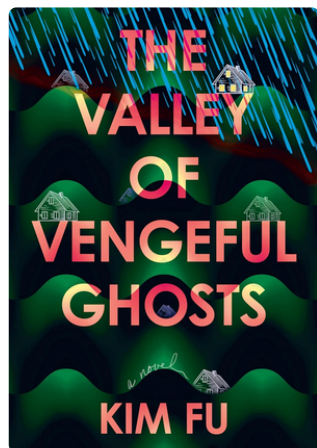
Yann Martel's highly anticipated first novel in a decade *Son of Nobody* (p.19) publishes in the US, UK, Australia, and Canada on March 31st, with rights sales in sixteen territories and counting. It has received two glowing starred reviews: [Kirkus](#) called it a "powerful meditation on life, death, and the vanity of human wishes" and "a stunningly imagined revisitation of an ancient past that is every bit as awful as the present," while [Booklist](#) deemed it "original, thought-provoking, and utterly absorbing." The buzz is spreading rapidly, with legendary indie bookseller [Betsy Burton](#) describing it as "an astounding feat of literary imagination," and the novel finding its place on numerous lists, including: [BBC](#), [Oprah Daily](#), [The Times](#), [The Guardian](#), [The Observer](#), [Elle](#), and [The Financial Times](#). Martel will embark on an international tour this spring, visiting the UK, US, Canada, Australia and New Zealand, and making more stops to other locations later this year.

Virginia Evans' #1 *New York Times* bestseller is a global sensation, with more than a million copies sold in North America and rights sales in more than 37 territories to date. Boosted by tremendous word of mouth from booksellers and readers alike, *The Correspondent* also topped the charts of *The Washington Post*, the *LA Times*, and *The Globe & Mail*. 2025 ended with finalist spots on Goodreads' 'Best Debut Novel' and 'Best Fiction' readers' choice polls, and inclusion on [The Sunday Times'](#) 'Best Books of the Year' list. Renowned journalist Katie Couric chose the debut novel as the [first pick of her livestreaming book club](#), calling heroine Sybil "a soothing balm for our collective souls." The inspiring story of the author's perseverance (this success comes after nearly twenty years of writing without being published) has been celebrated in numerous festivals and interviews, including [The New York Times' Book Review Podcast](#).



We're thrilled to announce that **Leanne Betasamosake Simpson** won the [Hilary Weston Writers' Trust Prize for Non-fiction](#) for her bestselling book *Theory of Water: Nishnaabe Maps to the Times Ahead*. The prize celebrates excellence in Canadian literary non-fiction, and rewards the recipient with \$75,000. The jury cited: "Simpson's brilliant and sintering weave of story, research, and Nishnaabeg teachings offers a generous and transformative perspective on world-building. *Theory of Water* shows us how to reimagine life as we know it, embodying hope."

We were proud to have three titles on the [Canada Reads](#) longlist, and one is currently a finalist on Canada's annual televised Battle of the Books competition! **Loghan Paylor's** *The Cure for Drowning* has been named a finalist, while **Rachel Phan's** *Restaurant Kid* and **Leanne Toshiko Simpson's** *Never Been Better* were longlisted. Paylor's speculative historical novel will be championed by Tegan Quin of the band Tegan & Sara during the broadcasts in April. *The Cure for Drowning* was longlisted for the Giller Prize and named a Best Book of 2024 by *The Globe and Mail*, shortlisted for the BC & Yukon Book Prizes in 2025, and Paylor served as a juror for the 2025 Giller Prize.



Critically acclaimed author of *Lesser Known Monsters of the 21st Century* **Kim Fu's** buzzworthy new novel *The Valley of Vengeful Ghosts* (p.17) has been widely praised leading up to its March 3rd publication. The spellbinding novel has also earned two starred reviews: [Kirkus](#) has called it "highbrow horror that's still a page-turner," and *Foreword* has described it as "riveting," and it's been named a Most Anticipated Book of 2026 from [TIME](#), [Book Riot](#), [Chicago Review of Books](#), and [Ms. Magazine](#)!

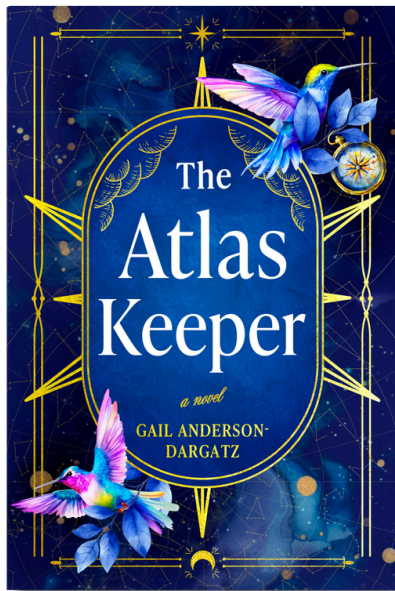

Elsie Campbell’s life has stalled. Since her mother’s death five years ago, she’s lived in her sister’s basement in the same small town where she was born. She has no real friends, no romance, and spends her days crunching data for her dad’s mapping firm. And now, as her sister marries, she’s about to lose her home.

The day after a solar eclipse, Elsie hikes to the lookout where her mother died. There she finds an atlas filled with maps and astrological charts that has the power to send her to twelve turning points in her life. But in visiting the past she makes surprising discoveries about herself, and knowing about the future has unexpected consequences.

When the atlas leads her both back to her old boyfriend and towards a new love, Elsie finds herself at a crossroads where she must choose between a familiar and nostalgic road or an uncharted path. Can she really change the course of her life? And should she?



GAIL ANDERSON-DARGATZ’s first novel, *The Cure for Death by Lightning*, was a finalist for the Giller Prize and won the UK’s Betty Trask Award, the BC Book Prize for Fiction and the Vancity Book Prize. Her second novel, *A Recipe for Bees*, was nominated for the Dublin Literary Award and was a finalist for the Giller Prize. *The Spanning Grounds* was nominated for the Sunburst Award

and the Ontario Library Association Evergreen Award and shortlisted for the Canadian Authors Association Award for Fiction. Her thriller, *The Almost Wife*, hit the Canadian bestseller lists in 2021. Anita Rau Badami ASHA IN HER GARDEN

A big-hearted, compulsively readable novel about Asha Mohan, a woman who is given the opportunity to reconsider the narrative of her life while there is still time. *Asha in Her Garden* is a gorgeous paean to the complexities of family and friends, the unanticipated consequences of ambition, and the mysteries and miracles that reside in every person's life.

Asha Mohan's well-loved backyard garden in Montréal, shaded by a cherished old maple tree, has been witness to all the events in her life since she and her husband and children moved to Canada from India decades ago. It is here, in her sanctuary, that Asha finds refuge from her complicated family, and exchanges gossip and advice over a shared hedge with Madame Brard, her formidable business-minded next-door neighbor, who took a newly arrived Asha under her wing long ago. It is also under the magnificent tree where – on the evening of her 50th birthday – Asha was knocked unconscious by an unsavory drug-dealing acquaintance of her wayward son.

Now the maple tree has reached the end of its life and must be cut down. In the shadow of its demise, Asha finds herself remembering the attack of twenty years back and haunted by an even earlier, shocking tragedy in India, when her marriage was still young, that led her to uproot her family and leave the country of her birth. As Asha re-examines herself and her reconfigured garden in relation to her friends, her loved ones ("two children from the same body – mine – and each a complete stranger"), and the state of the world, she unearths surprising new clarity about who she is and what might be required of her now – a vision that just may transform her life.

ANITA RAU BADAMI's first novel was the bestseller *Tamarind Woman*.

Her bestselling second novel, *The Hero's Walk*, won the Regional Commonwealth Writers' Prize and Italy's Premio Bertolucci, was named a Best Book by *The Washington Post* in 2001, longlisted for the Dublin Literary Award and the Orange Prize for Fiction, and was a finalist for the Kiriyaama Prize. Her third novel, *Can You Hear the Nightbird Call?*, was released in 2006 to great acclaim, longlisted for the Dublin Literary Award, and named a finalist for the City of Vancouver Book Award. The recipient of the Marian Engel Award for a woman writer in mid-career. Badami lives in Montréal.

Ann Y.K. Choi ALL THINGS UNDER THE MOON

In 1924, Korea is an occupied country. In Seoul’s secret, underground networks and throughout the countryside, rebellion against the Japanese Empire simmers, threatening to boil over. Kim Na-Young lives a simple life in the rural village of Daegeori, where she watches the moon rise and set over the pine-wooded mountains, tends to her household alongside her best friend, Yeon-Soo, and cares for her sick mother.

But the occupation touches every Korean life – even Na-Young’s. In the wake of a tragedy that stuns the village, Na-Young’s father arranges her marriage to a man she’s never met, and Na-Young and Yeon-Soo decide to flee, taking their fate into their own hands. That decision sets them on their own collision course with the occupying forces, resulting in a violent encounter that will alter both their lives forever – in shockingly different ways.

Taking us from a small village to the bustling corridors of Seoul, where women and girls can learn to read and write in multiple languages and members of the revolution pass coded messages through the back rooms of teahouses, Ann Y.K. Choi weaves a masterful tale of one woman taking command, not only of her own identity, but her own destiny.

A sweeping journey through historical Korea and an utterly compelling portrait of one woman’s remarkable life, *All Things Under the Moon* is both a stunning literary achievement and a beautifully written tribute to the sacrifices women make for each other.



ANN Y.K. CHOI is originally from Chung-Ju, South Korea and is a Toronto-based author and educator. Her debut novel, *Kay’s Lucky Coin Variety*, was shortlisted for the Toronto Book Award. Choi teaches creative writing at the University of Toronto, School of Continuing Studies.

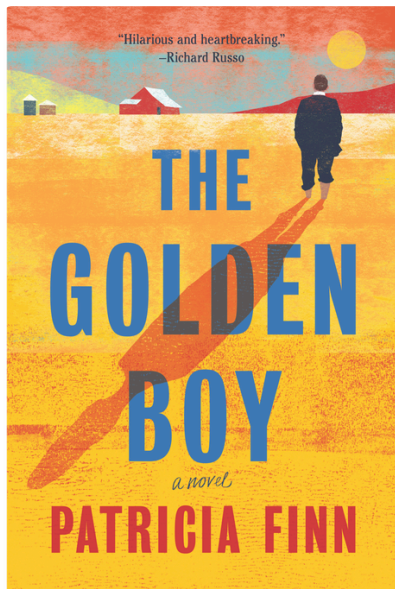

After an involuntary retirement from his high-flying Hollywood career, Stafford Hopkins has retreated to a luxury estate on Maui, along with his wife Agnes, both grimly resigned to life in a paradise where neither feels fully at home.

Stafford is ready to retreat into himself, too, when a letter arrives with shocking news. Stafford has been named guardian of four children he didn’t know existed: the grandchildren of his late childhood friend, Bobby Shepherd, whose ghost Stafford can no longer ignore.

Returning to both the hardscrabble farming town and the dark secret he’d tried to forget for decades, Stafford is forced to confront his past in order to rebuild his future – and to redirect the fates of his family and the four young people suddenly in his care.

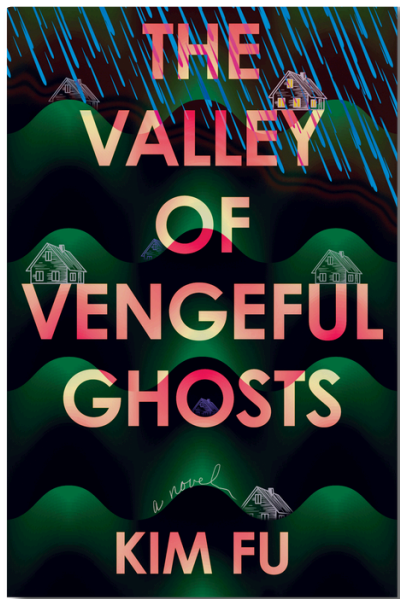

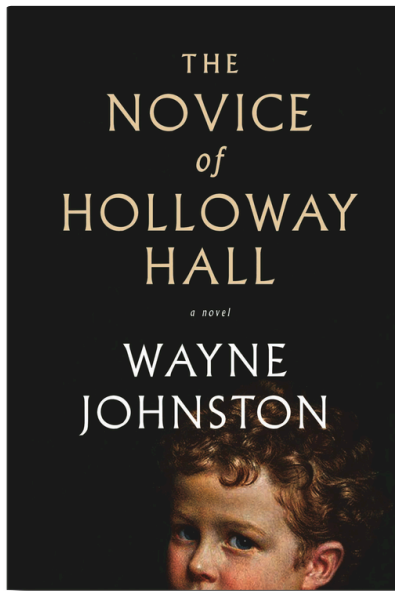

Harlow Donne has devoted his life to the Classical world. When a chance comes up to study an obscure collection of papyrus fragments at Oxford University, he seizes it. 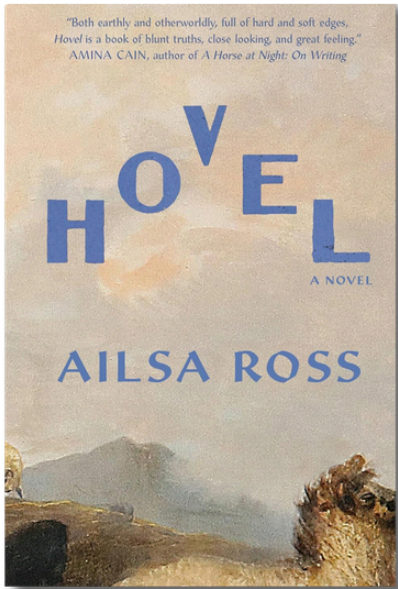

Homesickness takes many forms. Alone in the mountains because of her husband’s job, occupied by little more than online video captioning she calls “kitten work,” our narrator becomes fascinated by the not-long-gone life of her Scottish ancestors, a time when the lamplighter took the night off for the full moon, girls bathed their faces in morning dew, and people sang to the seals.

Her husband, however, is unsure of the emotional efficacy of cooking by candlelight, peeing in the woods, and writing vexed letters to the mayor about the birds living in the doomed aspens behind their apartment building. Especially because the letters are being read, out loud, at the town meetings attended by unimpressed neighbors. But our narrator is bewitched by the liminality of memory.

In a novel of compelling poetic precision and depth, Ross captures the lengths we go to for connection when we’re alone, following threads of personal history and fascination to conclusions one can only reach when there’s too much time on one’s hands and it’s too cold to go outside.

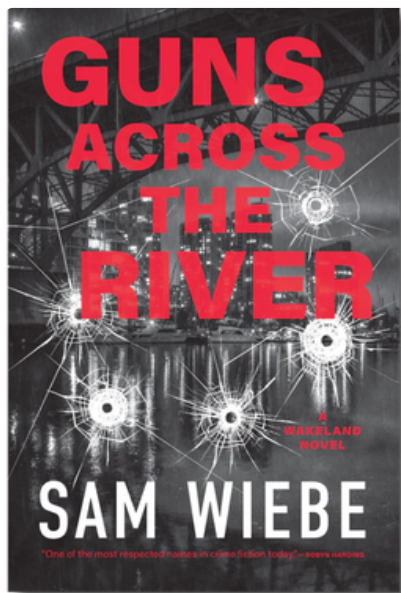
Craig Shreve THE MAROON KING

Shreve is the author of *One Night in Mississippi* and *The African Samurai*, the latter of which was published by Simon & Schuster Canada and has sold in eighteen territories worldwide. *The African Samurai* was named one of 2023's best books by *Quill & Quire* and *The Miramichi Reader*, and was longlisted for the Wilbur Smith Adventure Writing Prize in the UK. Interwoven with stories of early explorers and modern-day Antarcticans, the narrative poetically conveys the isolation and the endless silence that ultimately allows her to explore the grief that has lingered since the untimely deaths of her father and sister.

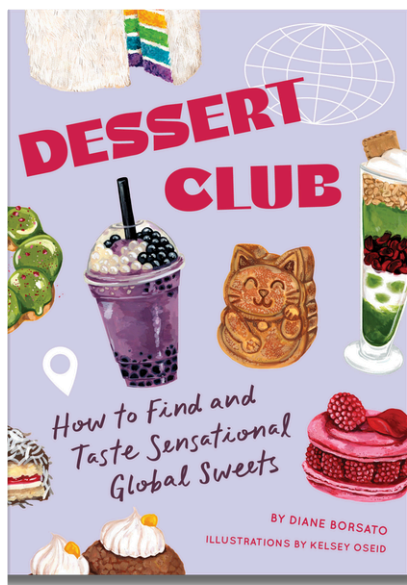

Order the nut cake! Based on decades of experience, this is one of the most reliable shortcuts in the face of complex dessert decisions, and among the favorite cakes for long. Some of the finest cakes (for me) come from these distant pastures, which, handily, is the nut cake. It's easy for anyone to love the mellowing kick of almonds, the perfume, and the most luscious of nutty fats. It's possible that as a northern Italian, I'm generally predisposed to adoring the bitterness and crunch of this regional luxury because my ancestors have included them in almost everything celebratory, special, and delicious for centuries.

My family loves Italian chocolate sponge cakes, chunky with embedded nuts, along with a cup of espresso or coffee. I tend toward the plainer variations, the cakes that center the distinctive aromatic, floral oil of just one nut at a time. These are made with ground nut meal, not merely flavored with wheat flour. If it is used at all. They are the ones that you

see in the display case of a good cafe, practically translucent with oils and glowing with ambient window light. Trust me and order that cake.

The best of all the nut cakes I've tasted have come after a restaurant meal, arriving at the table very fresh, soft, and warm. I tasted an almond cake with soft, melting chocolate shavings at a swanky Middle Eastern restaurant that made me forget everything that I ate there or that I ate at all the days. The twenty, sticky slices of almond cake is brightened by hot and cool in this case, a dollop of almond yogurt cream. If you can find a dessert like this, with every satisfying element in contrast and balance, it will carry you away with contentment.

I am also thrilled that the rich and dense kinds of Pistachio Cake that—despite how expensive pistachios are—are increasingly available in coffee shops and on fashionable restaurant dessert menus. These are the luscious green cakes that draw your tongue with oil and might even moisturize your hands! Try to find a Pistachio Cake made with moderate, not drastic, citrus notes, or all those—anything else because (as the Italians, who were just there on pizza, bread) pistachios go with everything. Life begins with your butterfly fingertips all over it, and sips your great-taste for the very fine gifts of trees.

There's a sustainable, climate-friendly, and affordable way to feed our ever-growing population: stop dismissing the ten trillion tiny fish harvested annually as inedible "trashfish," and recognize their potential as an ocean superfood.

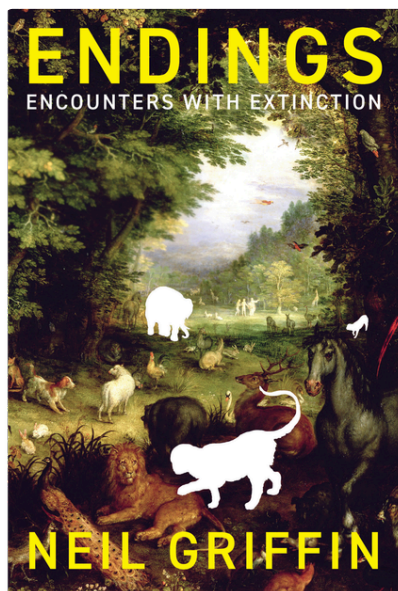

Encounters with Extinction

For over a decade Neil Griffin worked as a wildlife biologist, tracking the disappearing and the dead of our world, from Canada’s boreal forests to the Amazon basin, from Ethiopia’s Afar desert to the Virunga Mountains of Rwanda, confident that through a commitment to reasoned knowledge, catastrophe could be averted and humans could find a way to go on living alongside the other inhabitants of Earth. But he no longer thinks that is true. Simply knowing about extinction doesn’t explain its history, its connections to our lives, and why it matters. This book seeks those explanations.

A very personal history of extinction, it is a chronicle of his efforts to understand the world we will bequeath to our children. Along the way he looks at how extinction occurs and reoccurs in human myth, story, and science, and references the work of a wide variety of historical and contemporary poets, philosophers, historians, and scientists. In the author’s words, “It is a book for people who feel dislocated and alienated in the growing ruins of the natural world. It is also funnier than all this might lead you to believe.

“It’s an elegy, but it is not a funeral mass. It contains hope. Small, fierce, and hard-earned – but hope, nonetheless. We cannot remake the world that was. The dodo is not coming back, nor is the Yangtze River dolphin. The northern white rhinoceros will certainly go extinct. But hundreds of thousands more species are not yet at that point. They stand on the edge of extinction, but with time enough to haul them back, rather than push them over.”

Here is a book that is a major contribution to that cause.

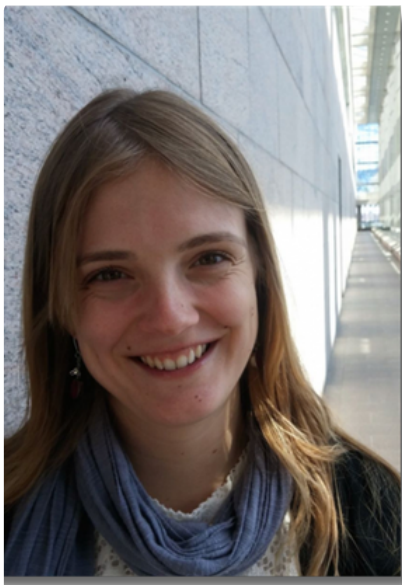


NIEL GRIFFIN is a writer and naturalist.

Care Under the Clock

Care is not a finite resource. Taking care of one another takes time and energy, but, unlike fossil fuels or lithium deposits, our capacity to care is abundant and renewing.

Yet, one look at today's headlines tells a different story. Around the globe, policymakers and advocates alike have declared a care crisis. Emergency rooms and classrooms strain under the pressure. Our intimate caring duties – tending to family, home, community – are in perpetual collision against our working hours. We – especially women – feel overwhelmed, inadequate, as if we are failing.

Drawing on research, cultural analysis, and the author's lived experience as a professor, mother, and community activist, Rebecca Hall reframes today's "care crisis" as a collision between the slow, circular rhythms of care and the accelerating demands of capitalist time. Under an economic system where time is money, care is pushed to the margins. By revealing how our lives have come to be measured by economic value, *Life Time* opens space to imagine more humane, caring ways of living beyond the capitalist clock.

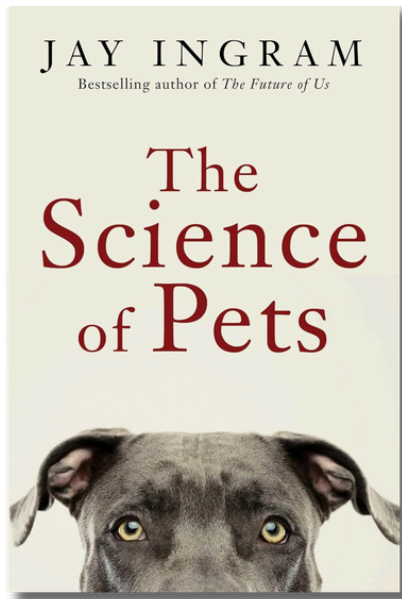

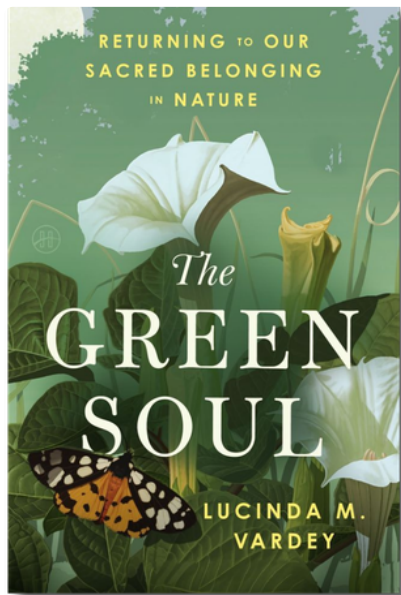

Vardey's field notes emerge from her own environment: a 500-year-old farmhouse in an ancient valley in Tuscany, neighboring fields of wildflowers, a mountain stream, and an ancient stone barn now dedicated as a chapel for climate care. Saint Francis of Assisi once walked in this very place, calling the earth Mother and praising all its creation.

But you don't have to live on sacred lands to experience the full gifts of the Green Soul. Drawing upon ecological research, awe-evoking narratives of sacred encounter in nature, and spiritual teachers of the ages, Vardey reveals the modern problem of our exile from spiritual belonging with the earth, as well as a field map for renewing this sacred contact. Consider this your invitation to walk among the wildflowers, rewilding your spirituality and renewing your life.
